From the Grand Sword Bearer

The Gavel:

I am compelled to speak on the Gavel and what it means to the Brethren, the Officers, to candidates, and our Lodge. It is interesting that the first time the Gavel is known to a candidate is it being struck while perambulating. In the dark, they move (while conducted) and as they pass the strike of the gavel is heard. This is done to communicate that they are properly clothed and in due form.

The Gavel also stops the class at various points in our Ritual as direction is then given by the Worshipful Master. The Gavel also makes an appearance in our Working Tools of the Entered Apprentice Degree. In essence, a Common Gavel is used to shape and break off rough parts of a stone (and we spiritually must also use our spiritual Gavel to excise our temptations, our greed, our ego (any of the Seven Deadly Sins), so we can better create ourselves as God intended, making ourselves (from the inside out), a better man.

We can not speak of the Ashlar without recognizing its counterpart; the Gavel. We can not address our rough edges without first becoming adept in mastering our efforts with the Gavel. Our own journey is a constant effort of knowing thy self and striking away imperfections.

The Gavel, is also a symbol of authority (not leadership). The Gavel is a controlling device that is a tool of leadership. It allows forward movement but most of all it is an instrument of Harmony. If properly used, it keeps all as one and (as the Common Gavel) strikes down disruptions.

The Gavel for myself, has also become a symbol of Trust. The imperative trust as the Brethren elect Officers to lead them through the future (the seas of troubled waters as well as peaceful harbors). Brethren who have elected a Worshipful Master to lead them and willingly follow his direction. It is the instrument that harnesses finality in decision making. This trust is embodied in the Gavel. This trust is what each Worshipful Master of any Lodge has embraced and handed down.

From the District Advisor

My Brethren and Friends,

Several decades ago, I wrote an article for the Empire State Mason titled "The Gemach – Deeds of Loving Kindness", which in hindsight seems apropos as we approach the Holy Season of Passover and Easter. In my message this quarter, I would like to share some excerpts from that article and hope that it will instill an urge in each of us to perform a deed of loving kindness.

The paper begins with a statement from the American Patriot, Brother Benjamin Franklin, a member of St. John's Lodge in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, who wrote, "It [Freemasonry] has peculiar to itself; but of what do those principally consist? They consist of signs and tokens, which serve as testimonials of character and qualifications, which are only conferred after a due course of instruction and examination. These are of no small value; they speak a

universal language, and act as a passport to the attention and support of the initiated in all parts of the world.

They cannot be lost so long as memory retains its power. Let the possessor of them be expatriated, shipwrecked, or imprisoned; let him be stripped of everything he has got in the world; still these credentials remain and are available for use as circumstances require. The great effects, which they have produced, are established by the most incontestable facts of history.

They have stayed the uplifted hand of the destroyer; they have softened the aspirates of the tyrant; they have mitigated the horrors of malevolence, and broken down the barriers of political animosity and sectarian alienation. On the field of battle, in the solitude of the uncultivated forests, or in the busy haunts of the crowded city, they have made men of the most hostile feelings, and most distant religions, and the most diversified conditions, rush to the aid of each other, and feel social joy and satisfaction that they have been able to afford relief to a brother Mason."

The emphasis placed on Freemasonry can be found in its unique ability to proliferate a level playing field. As explicated in the conferral of the Degree of Entered Apprentice, the initiate who has been divested of all metallic substances and has replaced his secular clothing with a ceremonial costume, begins a symbolic process of "leveling" or equalization. Thereby following a path to which all worthy brethren have traversed before.

The Rev. Dr. James Anderson compiled in England in 1723 the first official <u>Constitutions of</u> <u>the Freemasons</u> from the "Old Charges", committing the Craft to the concept that "Masonry being found in all nations, even of divers religions, they are now charged to adhere to that religion in which all Men agree, leaving their particular opinions to themselves, that is, to be good and true men, men of honor and honesty, by whatever names, religions, or persuasions they may be distinguished."

By precluding all religious and political polemic, controversy and speculation, Freemasonry eludes Sectarian divisiveness and discord and opens the way for the admission of men of goodwill and good character, regardless of their race, creed or nationality. One only needs to delve into the history books to clearly observe and find where the philosophical and moral teachings of Freemasonry have taken a foothold. Basic individual freedoms and human rights coupled with religious and political tolerance usually prevail in nations whose leaders were or are Masons and have embraced the fraternity's tenets.

To quote from the ancient Charges of Freemasonry, "...by whatever Denomination or Persuasions they may be distinguished, whereby Masonry becomes the centre of Union, and the means of conciliating true Friendship among Persons that must else have remained at a perpetual distance... ...a Mason is a peaceable Subject to the Civil Powers, wherever he resides or works, and is never concerned in Plots and Conspiracies against Peace and Welfare of the Nation, nor to behave himself un-dutifully to inferior Magistrates; for as Masonry hath been always injured by War, Bloodshed, and Confusion, so ancient Kings and Princes have been much disposed to encourage Craftsmen, because of their Peacefulness and Loyalty, whereby they practically answered the cavils of their Adversaries, and promoted the Honor of the Fraternity, whoever flourish in Times of Peace..."

In his commentary on "Symbols & Instruments", Dr. Norman Pearson, Ph.D., D.B.A., a Fellow of the College of Freemasonry, published in the Autumn 1999 issue of <u>Ariadne's Web</u>, he safely rationalizes that in "many places such as India, or in South Africa under the dreaded Apartheid, the Masonic Lodge was the only place in society where men of good will could meet in peace and harmony, beyond the divisions of class, creed, caste, pigmentation or religious intolerance..." Dr. Pearson focuses our attention to life's lessons as espoused by the German philosopher Immanuel Kant, who alleged that "each life is of value and an end in itself; the chance for human freedom and tolerance; the idea of democracy and equality before the Law; the concept of constitutional governance and self-determination at the 'local level', the respect for all attempts to understand the infinite; and the dominance of human brotherhood, trying to remove all divisive and cruelly discriminatory barriers based on such things as ethnicity, pigmentation, age, origins, creed, culture and all evils which have produced human suffering."

During the derivation of the Craft in the 18th and early 19th centuries, John Hamill and Robert Gilbert in <u>Freemasonry: A Celebration of the Craft</u>, report that there was "a tendency among some Masons to view the Craft as a purely Christian institution... The non-sectarian nature of the Craft should have been obvious by its admission of Jews from at least 1721, when practicing Jews are known to have been initiated at London in the Goose and Gridiron Lodge, one of the four Lodges that constituted the first Grand Lodge." Further, the previous historians note that "Jews [were] regularly elected as Grand Lodge officers from 1760 onwards." Albert C. Stevens identifies several Lodges in London that admitted Jewish members as early as 1732. During the course of his research, Stevens discovered a Masonic Handbook printed in London in 1756 containing "prayers for the use of Jewish Freemasons", which suggests that Jews were present in significant numbers.

In support of the nonpartisan nature of the Craft, it is interesting to note that Beaconsfield Lodge No. 1662 of London, England was named in honor of a distinguished public servant of Jewish descent. Specifically, I refer to Sir Benjamin Disraeli, the Prime Minister of England who served under HRM Queen Victoria. The Monarch bestowed upon Benjamin Disraeli the noble title of the first Earl of Beaconsfield. Even though, Benjamin Disraeli was not himself a Mason, the said Masonic Lodge requested his permission to use his official title and armorial bearings at the consecration of Beaconsfield Lodge No. 1662 on February 24, 1877.

Within the journal published by the National Masonic Research Society titled "The Builder", Volume II, Page 221, the position is affirmed that although "many Masons are Christians, Masonry is not distinctively Christian either in its teaching or in its basis of fellowship..." The noted physician, Masonic historian, and jurist, III. Brother Albert G. Mackey, 33^o, described the ecumenicity of Freemasonry in the "Masonic Ritualist" as being "...to every Mason, whatever may be his particular religious creed, that revelation of the Deity, which is recognized by his religion becomes his trestle board. Thus the trestle board of the Jewish Mason is the Old Testament; of the Christian, the Old and New Testament; of the Mohammedan, the Koran, to the Brahman, the Vedas, and to the Parsee, the Zendavesta... ...Masonically, the book of the Law is that sacred book, which is believed by the Mason of any particular religion to contain the revealed word of God."

In the essay, "The Masonic Order and Religion", the R:W:Brother and Rev. H. R. Allen, Grand Chaplain of the Grand Lodge of Ireland maintains that "Freemasonry is for men who already have their personal and individual allegiance to religion, be it the Christian faith, or one of the other Great Religions of the world. It has no systematic theology. It does not go from faith to speculation, which is theology; but from faith to demonstration, which is life... A man becoming a Mason is expected to come with the Faith he already has, and will continue to have, both inside and outside the orbit of his Masonry." Cogitating upon this thought brings to mind the question posed before every candidate of Freemasonry, "In whom do you put your trust?" The answer must be forthright and it must be true. Masonry provides a unique pathway for self-improvement, however, without God and without a proper foundation and belief system, Masonry cannot hope to teach the candidate this most basic precept of life and faith. The atheist or godless cannot enter the Craft, as their heart-of-hearts is barren and desolate – leaving no acceptable place to be made a Mason. Why, because the candidate is first made a Mason in his heart and it is in his heart where God dwells.

R: W: Allen elaborates further upon the universality or wholeness of Freemasonry and the embrace of God through many faiths by predicating that "there is no separate Masonic God; a Mason's God is the God of the religion he professes. When the Supreme Being is described in Masonry as the Great Architect, any Mason will think, as he prays in his Lodge, just as he thinks when he prays at home or in Church [Temple, Mosque or Synagogue.] Similarly, our Jewish Brethren will think of Him as the God he knows – Adonai, or as we learn the sacred name symbolized by the sacred Tetragramaton. So the Moslem or those of other religions will have their own understanding of the Supreme Being. It is no part of Freemasonry to attempt to join religions together. There is no composite Masonic God. We each enter the Lodge room with the God we know and worship – we do not leave God outside."

The poet laureate and Freemason, Brother Rudyard Kipling, expressed this concept of universality in his poem titled "The Mother Lodge", as he calls to mind the essence and his introduction into Hope and Esperance Lodge No. 782, in Lahore, India. According to Kipling's verse, his Mother Lodge consisted of every conceivable occupation from the Rail Road Station

Master and the Accountant to the Military Sergeant and the Draftsman. Further, Kipling captures the religious diversification of the Lodge by accrediting the membership of Amir Singh the Sikh, Castro the Roman Catholic, and Saul the Jew.

In the spring of 1976, His Eminence the late Terrence Cardinal Cooke, of the See of the Roman Catholic Church of New York, addressed some 3,000 Masons at the 31st Annual Masons and Sons Dedication Breakfast, where he shared his observations about our noble vocation. Excerpted from this historic homily that underscores the all inclusiveness of the Masonic Fraternity, Cardinal Cooke gave recognition to the fact "that George Washington was a vigorous Mason, and that at his Inaugural he invited a Minister, a Rabbi, and a Catholic Priest..."

Clearly becoming a bellwether of modern thought and still rings true some 47 years later, our prestigious keynote speaker, Cardinal Cooke, mends many bridges with the observation that "I know of your firm belief in a Supreme Being, the Great Architect of the Universe, and of your great reverence for the Bible, and other Holy Writings appropriate to the religion of your members. I salute you for your loyalty to these ancient values... Here in America, a principal bulwark of our freedom has been our voluntary organizations, like the Freemasons, dedicated in a religious spirit to order in the soul and order in society. These free associations are well-organized groups of people who believe in a community of spirit and who labor to reconcile the claims of duty and the claims of liberty, under God... I plead for unity under God for all Americans... may we be all united, Americans of every religion, of every race, of every calling. All one, under God, in the continuing quest for the fulfillment of the American Dream as we walk together into the third century of American history."

I plan to continue this article in the June bulletin as it contains some important thoughts that each of us should embrace. Until then, may you and your family have a blessed Passover and a glorious Easter. May God watch over you and keep you under His protective care this day and forevermore.
